	Additional Special Variation (ASV)		
	After the lowest rate peg in 20 years was set at 0.7 per cent late last year there was a significant backlash from councils across NSW especially in rural and regional areas struggling to recover from bushfires, floods, COVID-19 and droughts.		
	After realising the critical situation with forecasts of 1,000 council jobs cuts across the State, the new Minister for Local Government Wendy Tuckerman cleared the way for councils across NSW to apply for a one-off rate additional variation if they could show the funding was critical and included in their long term financial plans. This is allowed to exceed 0.7 per cent but be capped at 2.5 per cent.		
	The Minister has also tasked IPART with reviewing their rate peg methodology including the Local Government Cost Index to prevent a reoccurrence of the 2022-23 anomaly.		
	Coffs Harbour City Council has taken up the offer to apply for a further 1.8 per cent to take the rate peg to 2.5 per cent as this was used in the Long Term Financial Plan.		\$
	The 2.5 per cent as budgeted will ensure spending continuity across local roads, pools, parks and other community services that Coffs depends upon in addition to the much needed infrastructure projects which are assisting in pandemic recovery.		www.coffsharbour.nsw.gov.au
	This equates to an additional 45 cents per week for the average residential ratepayer.		arbou
